standards, assessors and providers should seek information and/or advice from mentors and colleagues, and/or discontinue involvement in the assessment process.

Patients can waive the requirement for giving final consent just before MAiD is provided, only if their natural death is reasonably foreseeable

being treated or resides; someone directly involved in providing health-care services or directly provide personal care to the patient (unless this is their primary occupation and they are paid to do so ); or a practitioner who will provide MAiD to the patient or an opinion confirming the patient meets the eligibility criterial for MAiD.

The independent witness and a proxy signer can be a) related to each other, and b) related to the patient if they meet the requirements for being an independent witness or proxy signer.

The answer is "no" for page 1 of the request form since a witness cannot act in two different capacities (i.e. cannot witness their own proxy signature).

The answer is "yes" for page 6 of the request form since the prior witness would only be acting in one capacity—as the proxy signer to confirm the patient's final consent for MAiD.
